

(# admitted since opening Jan 31, 2014)






179 (4.1 %) By ambulance 30.7 % of people admitted to TBC experienced transport to a hospital. This in line with the Association of Ontario Midwives statistics for transports from home births.

- 74.5% of all transports were nonurgent transports to hospital by private vehicle
- 5.6% of transports went to St.
 Michael's Hospital by midwives without hospital privileges
- 1.0% of transports went to Sick Kids Hospital

Access and Equity






Why a prenatal sharing circle?

Every Thursday at 7 pm, EST, TBC hosts a sharing circle for expecting parents to come share space with each other, a registered midwife, and a staff member from TBC.


Some reasons people attend:






- Lanscaped into the four Directions
